

A piece for the musical imagination, featuring gulls, kettle drums, quayside trombones, and the fog horns of ships in harbour.


The setting that inspired this piece is Dartmouth harbour in Devon, England. For the imagined performance of the piece, the setting could be any harbour with a long, straight quayside. The reader, referred to as the 'Listener', should imagine themself standing, alone or with others, on the quayside, facing the harbour. In front of the listener and stretching out in both directions, left and right, along the quayside is a long row of trombonists. The further the trombonists are from the listener, the more spread out they become. The furthest trombonists, a quarter of a kilometre in each direction, are too far away to be clearly audible. In the harbour, not too far away, are some large ships whose fog horns are loud and sonorous. Behind, is a large group of kettle drums.


The following graphic score represents the aural events of the piece.






 ${\it NB}$: Trombonists 10 meters or more from the listener, face towards the listener.
