## **Note on the texts:**

Thomas Hardy's 'Weathers' is a fairly straightforward nature poem, though clear diction is required in one or two lines.

MacNeice's 'Bagpipe Music' is essentially a nonsense poem - the actual meaning of the words (if any) is unimportant. But for those whose are worried about this and are unfamiliar with 1930's British slang I provide the following guide:

'Peep-show' = fairground 'freak' show?

'Yogi-man' = practitioner of yoga and Eastern mysticism

'Blavatsky' = Madame Blavatsky, founder of Theosophism

'Hogmanay' = Scottish name for New Year's Eve

'Herring Board' = some sort of government fisheries body

'Fags' = cigarettes

'Ceilidh' (pronouced 'kay-lee') = traditional Scots music gathering
